THE LIGHT HAS DAWNED

The waiting is over and the light of the Lord, has dawned - the people who lived in darkness has seen a great light! Simeon and Anna have their faith rewarded. By holding on to their faith, they have literally seen the light! Yet we need to keep in view Simeon's realism. He knew all too well that the coming of Christ into the world did not mean an end to pain and suffering in the world. Some mistakenly think that belief in Jesus Christ means that we ought not to fear pain, suffering and even dying. Our faith helps us to keep the realities of pain, suffering and death in proper perspective; it does not mean that we will avoid them! There is no avoiding death, even for the Lord of life. The sword of witnessing the death of her son did indeed pierce Mary's soul, but she did not allow that pain to extinguish the candle of faith burning inside her. She kept the light of faith burning in her heart!

The shadow of the cross always looms large in our Christian faith. This should not make us feel gloomy and sad, but rather remind us of the reality of sin and death and how much God loves us in Christ Jesus. The only fitting response to such love, is loving thankfulness. In baptism, we enter into the great mystery of sin and death, and when, like Christ, we inevitably die, we pray to share in his resurrection. Then and only then will all sin, pain, suffering and death be taken away. Let us pray that on this feast of the presentation of the Lord, when Joseph and Mary fulfilled their obligations by bringing their most precious gift to the temple and placing Him in the care of God, we may present our whole selves in the service of God's Kingdom, holding nothing back.

Secure in the knowledge that today, the people who lived in darkness and the shadow of death has seen a great light, may we reflect that light in all that we think, say and do.

THIS WEEK AT ST IGNATIUS

Presentation of our Lord: Thursday the 2nd of February is the feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas. This commemorates the ritual purification of Mary, forty days after the birth of her son Jesus. This is the day when we celebrate Mary and Joseph taking Jesus to the temple to fulfil the Jewish custom of offering their first-born son to the Lord and giving thanks for his birth. At both masses on this day (10.00am and 6.30pm), lighted candles will be blessed and processed into church from the porch.

Divine Mercy Mass & Devotions: These will take place on Tuesday, the 31st of January beginning with mass at 7.30pm.

PARISH ITEMS AND EVENTS

Protection of the Unborn: Sr Eugenia OSM writes, The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God... God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no one can, under any circumstance, claim for themselves the right directly to destroy an innocent human being." [2258]

In 1967, one of the most destructive Acts of Parliament was passed – the legislation of abortion. This year, 2017, marks 50 years since this Act, and over those years 8.7 million unborn babies have been killed by abortion in the United Kingdom. How much longer can we stand by and take no action? How can we go on ignoring this callous disregard for human life and not make our voices heard?

We can all understand the many difficult circumstances which can lead women to have an abortion and we must certainly show compassion towards those who have taken such a step, however, that should not stop us from fighting against further abortions in the future.

Again, the Catechism of the Catholic Church has this to say about abortion: "Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. From the first moment of his/her existence, a human being must be recognised as having the right of a person

– among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life." [2270]

Next Sunday, the 5th of February, we will be having our annual White Flower Appeal. We ask you to be alert and eager to help this appeal in three ways: 1. Pray that human life will be once again respected in this country from the moment of conception until God calls us into eternity; 2. Take a white flower badge and make a donation to support the work of The Society for the Protection of Unborn Children; 3. Consider writing to your MP expressing your views about abortion and asking for a change in the law.
