“LET US REJOICE AND BE GLAD!”

Today, the 13th October, at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, Pope Francis will canonise Blessed John Henry Newman as a Saint of the Catholic Church. This is a great milestone, a time for jubilation, especially for the Catholics of England, Wales and Ireland. He will be the first English Saint to be canonised since 1970.

John Henry Newman was born in 1801, and brought up as an Anglican. For over 20 years he was an Anglican Clergyman, a Fellow of Oriel College, Oxford, where he studied the writings of the early Church. Through reflecting on these, he was led, eventually, to Catholicism, and in 1845 he embraced, as he said, “the one true fold of the Redeemer.” In 1847 he was ordained a Priest and went on to found the Oratory of St. Philip Neri in England.

Blessed John Henry Newman was renowned for his humility, his continual concern for the care of souls, his love for the poor, the hungry and the homeless. He died in Birmingham on the 11th August, 1890, when thousands lined the streets to show their love, respect and gratitude to him.

Cardinal Vincent, in his Pastoral Letter two weeks ago, said this: “An important aspect of Cardinal Newman's life was the long and difficult journey he made into the fulness of faith in the Catholic Church. This month of October has been designated by Pope Francis, as an ‘Extraordinary Month of Mission,’ when he invites us to renew our sense of mission, our task of bringing the Gospel to life so that others may see it and come to share its joy. The pope never ceases to remind us that we are ‘missionary disciples.’”

In 2010, Pope Benedict came to Birmingham for the Beatification Ceremony, which hundreds of people attended. It took place in the open air in a huge field and thousands of people were present – including a coach load from St. Ignatius' Church, myself among them! It was a very privileged occasion, especially as the ceremony took place very close to the area where Blessed John Henry Newman visited the sick and house-bound people. Let us give thanks today for his witness of faith and his constant example of love and concern for the poor and those in need.
