PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

Thursday is the Feast Day of the Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas. It is the day that commemorates the event when Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to the Temple to make the offering to God as prescribed by the books of Jewish Law. In Christian tradition it was the end of Christmastide, and the crib was taken down and stored for the following Christmas. The beautiful Gospel reading for the Feast is the encounter of the parents with the holy man Simeon, who had for many years longed to see "the Christ of the Lord", as well as with the prophetess Anna, who prayed in the temple for most of her life.

Meetings with the Saviour do not depend on rank or status, but on faithfulness and hope. This message becomes even more explicit in Jesus' own teaching, such as the wonderful sermon he gives in the Gospel of today, known as the "sermon on the mount". Jesus' words would have been a surprise to those who were blessed to hear him. Far from being shunned or neglected because of their weakness and sin, Jesus embraces all who are searching for a sign of hope and for forgiveness. This active seeking out of ordinary people seeking repentance and forgiveness will be even stronger during the Lenten season, which is approaching soon. The prophet Zephaniah reminds the people of the importance of faithfulness and honesty: "Seek the Lord, all you, the humble of the earth, who obey his commands. Seek integrity, seek humility."

NEXT WEEKEND: RACIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY

Racial Justice Sunday is the day the church focuses on the need to oppose racism and pursue racial justice with renewed vigour.

The theme for Racial Justice Sunday is, 'All are included in the mission of Christ and His Church. Let us walk, pray and work together'

This reflects the role each of us must play in promoting the mission of Christ and His Church. This was inspired by conversations around last year's Racial Justice Sunday and Pope Francis' visit to Canada in July 2022 when he spoke about looking towards a future of 'Justice, healing and reconciliation'.

St Augustine of Hippo once remarked, 'We should pray as if everything depended upon God and work as if everything depended upon us'. An observation which reminds us that our prayer and work complement each other. When applied to racial justice what else but walking together, in the full meaning of those words, can be the result. So we should pray fervently for racial justice.
